Introduction:

This listing of stonemasons is a work in progress. It was initiated by Cec and Susan Hayward of Assiniboia in the 1980s and 1990s while they were documenting stone buildings throughout Saskatchewan. Cec's photo album includes over 300 stone buildings, and many names of possible or verified stonemasons. This album can be seen at the Provincial Archives of Saskatchewan (PAS) – Accession 2012 – 215 (Box 63 of 68). When Marg Hryniuk, Larry Easton and I began our research for *Legacy of Stone: Saskatchewan's Stone Buildings* in 2004, I started to formalize Cec Hayward's inventory, so that we could readily determine when and where Saskatchewan's stonemasons lived and worked. A copy of the resulting index to Cec's inventory can be seen at the end of this document.

A number of stonemasons also worked as bricklayers, and I have therefore included both types of these masonry buildings in this document. Also, in some instances, several stonemasons / bricklayers are credited with the same building. This might indicate that several men were involved with the same project, or that there is conflicting historical documentation relating to those structures or to those men.

Where several family members worked together, they are generally listed as a single entry; however, if the stonemasons had separate careers, they are usually listed individually.

The Inventory – renamed "Saskatchewan Stonemasons" – currently identifies over 400 stonemasons, many of whom were mentioned in local histories and newspaper articles. About 60 of these are also included in *Legacy of Stone*.

Information relating to the identification of stonemasons and their work is not as well-documented as is that for architects and contractors, who often appear in official documents or newspaper advertisements and reports. In fact, much of what is known about Saskatchewan's stonemasons comes from oral tradition, either written in local histories or provided through direct communication with researchers over the years.

Affie, George

Biography: George (1853-1938) was born in Ontario from Irish parents. Married Eliza Ann Russel in 1877. He was a carpenter and stonemason. They moved to Saskatchewan in 1903, where he built his own stone homestead house at NW 14-5-12-w2m. Both George and Ann are buried in the Westphalia Cemetery, Midale.

Agar, James Reid

Biography: Born 1864; died 1941. He was primarily a carpenter, but may also have been a stonemason. In 1900 he was appointed to the Regina Agricultural Association, representing Balgonie and Hicksvale. He worked as a carpenter at Rouleau in April 1901 on buildings for Mr. Brownlee and a house for Mr. Quinn. He was appointed as a Commissioner for taking Affidavits in April 1901, and as an auditor in Dec, 1901. Retired as a Balgonie School Trustee in Jan. 1902; and worked as the contractor for the Presbyterian Church in 1902 in Balgonie – it opened in Sept. 1902. Need to verify that Reid was a stonemason.

Ironically, the home he built for Annie and himself was faced with local white brick.

Barber, Ben

Biography: Ben Barber (1862-1948) was born in Adjala Township, Simcoe County, Ontario and moved to Wolseley in 1883, followed in 1890 by other members of his family. During the North-West Conflict of 1885, Barber enlisted with the Transport Service of the federal government's North-West Field Force. In 1888 he married Annie Sutherland of Wolseley; she died in 1929; he in 1948, while living in Regina with his son Everard. Their other son, Merrill died in late October 1918 at age 19 – possibly from the Spanish Flu.

In the 1880s, 1890s and early 1900s Ben Barber worked in construction in the Wolseley area, helping Adam Cantelon build St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church at Moffat in 1892, and erecting a foot bridge across the local Wolseley Creek in 1895. In 1899-1900 be constructed Wolseley's four-room, two storey brick school on a stone foundation. (A 1917 addition matched his original design.) He served as the Wolseley area funeral director from about 1890 until about 1943, passing an official embalming course in 1911. In addition, Barber took chiropractic training in Davenport, Iowa and practised that profession for many years at Wolseley.

Ben Barber was to be buried in the Wolseley Cemetery on July 21, 1948, but no grave site has been found for him; nor for his wife Annie.





Cantelon, Adam

Biography: Adam Cantelon (1857-1948) was born in Clinton, Ontario. After he came West in 1883, Cantelon took out a homestead and became the first postmaster at Lorlie (SW of Melville) in 1887. He filled that position until 1897. By 1886 he was also involved in construction helping plaster some of the Presbyterian mission buildings at the File Hills Reserve. In 1891 he built the stone Presbyterian Church at Moffat, followed in 1892 by the stone Presbyterian church south of Abernethy. In 1897 he secured the contract to erect the large two storey farmhouse for W.R. Motherwell, near Abernethy. While working on that building, Cantelon fell off the scaffolding and broke his leg. Around 1905 he built the stone foundation for the Teese Barn near Lorlie. He retired from construction work in 1906 and moved to the Piapot area in SW Saskatchewan, where he took out a new homestead and focused on farming. Cantelon returned to Ontario several times during the winter months – including a trip in 1895-96 and another in 1920-21. Adam Cantelon never married and died in 1948 at age 91; he is buried in the Maple Creek Cemetery.

In the late 1890s or early 1900s Adam and/or his brother William (a bricklayer) worked in partnership with stonemason John Hunter out of Indian Head. In 1908 Hunter, Cantelon and Company planned to open a brickyard at Nokomis, but there is no evidence that they ever did so. The Hunter and Cantelon partnership dissolved in 1917; however, by that date the partners were John Hunter, Kirk Hunter, and William Cantelon. At present, there is no record of whether Adam ever was a partner, or when Kirk joined the company.

Lived in Fort Qu'Appelle from 1892 until 1894, when he moved to Indian Head, where he lived for about 50 years. He was also an avid curler. As early as 1898, and as late at 1917 he worked in partnership with stonemason Adam Cantelon. In 1908 they planned to open a brickyard at Nokomis. The Hunter and Cantelon partnership dissolved in 1917; however, by that date the partners were John Hunter, Kirk Hunter and William Cantelon. No idea when Adam left or Kirk and William joined.
