Using the *TimeLinks* **Image Archive Image Interpretation Worksheet**

Overview:

When we look at photographs and other images, we must think of them as documents that were created at a specific place, at a specific time, and with a specific purpose. We have to remember that photographs are made, not just taken. They reflect conscious purpose on the part of the photographer, and sometimes the subject. Sometimes we have direct information about the purpose of an image. At other times, we have to infer the purpose by examining the content and context of the image.

Sometimes, the strongest message that we get from a photograph is the one that the original photographer or subject intended. At other times, we gain insights that were not intended or imagined at the time that the image was created.

Exercise:

Take a few minutes to browse the image index, and select an image that interests you. Don't take too much time making your choice, you will have plenty of opportunities to browse later-on. Next, work your way through some of the questions below. Be prepared to comment on your image, why you selected it, and what it tells us as an historical document.
