















Skardal & Gemmil Transfer which operated from 1934-1945 with a fleet of five trucks. Clem Skardal at the wheel.



A north view of Baldur. Building to the left is the old Northern Pacific Hotel, owned by J. Dew for many years. Garage at centre was owned and operated by Siggi and Eiki Anderson who built it in 1927. To extreme right is Baldur Skating & Curling Rink, built in 1914 after the first Skating Rink (near where the lumber yard is now,) was abondoned.







High left - The buildings in this picture of the corner of Elizabeth and second are (left to right), Tom Poole's Hardware, his storehouse, and the Fowler house. Down Second Street is the Chester House. Where Royalite is now is the block built by P.F. Curtis in 1900. At this time it was run by the partnership of Allison and McDonald. The station is seen in the bottom right. The

partnership of Allison and McDonald. The station is seen in the bottom right. The Methodist (United) Church is seen down Second Street and the Presbyterian Church over Poole's Hardware. The picture was taken in 1911.

Low left - The picture was taken between 1900 and 1910. The buildings are (left to right), the Union Bank of Canada owned by Frank Shultz, Cleghorn's Drug Store, the post office with the high school upstairs - now the pool room and barbershop, combination barber shop and tailor shop where Lee's Lucky Dollar is now, Poole's first store and his ware-house, and the Fowler block.

Right: A picture of the Northwest end of Baldur in the 1920's showing the school and the Manitoba Pool Elevator. The house in the centre was owned for many years by Thordur Thorsteinson. It was destroyed by fire in the early 1930's while Daniel McKenzie was residing in it.










The Fowler block in early days. Note the horses tethered to right of the building.









Glenora in the early days. The phones to Pilot Mound and Baldur were located in this store.

Baldur Grist Mill - first built at St. Leon and moved to Baldur in late 1890's. Torn down about 1916.














Left - old Massey-Harris Garage. Billy Herron was first agent, then William Price, C.K. Lodge, and now Clem Skardal.




#### Some Carly Buildings

Left and lower left-house and barn are pictured on the Smeaton homestead where Jack Stone is today.Mr. Stone's mother is the girl at the right on the verandah.




Right-one of the most familliar landmarks north-west of Baldur, simply called the Old Stone Church. Now gone, it was built in 1906 by the Methodists.


















Residence on homestead cannot be done by proxy.

Any special leave of absence that may be granted shall not count as residence.




Proof that a settler is entitled to a patent must be made before the Local Agent of Domingot Lands, a Homestead Inspector or an Intelligence Officer. Failure to apply for patent for homestead subjut a period of 5 years from date of entry renders right hable to forfeiture.






Harvesting on the Johann Johnson farm around 1914.












Self-propelled straw burning Robert Bell Steamer used about 1914. Threshing in this picture is at the farm at Johann Johnson.

The engine to right was used by Clark Threshing Gang in 1915. It was a self-propelled International gas engine or a Rummley Oil Pull.




Close up of Robert Bell Steamer. Men employed in threshing gangs earned around \$1.00 a day for more than twelve hours of work.






Close up of threshing gang moving to a farm to begin harvesting.


