Parks & Murals



The Arts Park featured extensive flower gardens. The space near the intersection of South Railway Street and Highway #10 has a huge purple martin house, and an informative sign. Walk the town to see dozens of murals.

Welch Block



This building's random-rubble fieldstone construction was once quite common in Boissevain, made possible by a nearby source of stone and available craftsmen. Few stone business blocks remain, even rarer are storefronts that retain such detailed main-floor display windows.

Andrew R. Welch was an early long-term owner.

Land Titles Office

North Railway Street - 1903



Designed by Winnipeg architect W. B. Lait. Brick with sandstone foundation, limestone trim

Its functions were eventually transferred to the Brandon office, the building is now occupied by another provincial government department.

Boissevain Town Hall

Cook Street



Erected in 1910, the Town Hall was the centre of local government, with space for the fire hall, courtroom, and jail. Note the distinctive second-floor windows and decorative stone and brickwork with elements of Classical Revival styling.
