St. Andrew’s Anglican Church 1894



The church is a good example of Anglican/English style with its steep gable, and nice windows. The cornerstone was brought from Boissevain by team and wagon by Ben Roper and Robert Taylor.

Lewis Building - 1902



In 1901 Walpole Murdoch and F.G. Lewis bought the Hartney Star from Dr. Woodhull. Other known uses include; The Union Bank, The Bank of Montreal, a telephone office, and a Liquor Commission outlet.

When Annie Playfair was owner of the Hartney Star (1910), she lived on the upper floor.

Crawford Building 1902



The bell tower has been altered, and it never did contain a bell. The building served as a Mr. Crawford’s jewelry store for four years before being sold to the Union Bank. Later the building saw long service as Link’s Grocery Store and McDowell’s Grocery. It is prominent in many early photos.
