

Elgin's Main Street

The story of Elgin is the story of rapid growth. In 1898 when the railway came through, there was not a building on the present site. By 1900 the population of the village was about 400, and there were many more families in the district than at present.

By 1913, as progress continued, Elgin had a school, four churches, an active band, and 34 places of business.

Built in 1904 the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce building, to the right in the photo and featured in the inset, was originally two stories high, providing accommodation for the bank manager. The second level was removed in the 1950s. After the bank closed in 1995, it became the Elgin and District Museum.

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
