

Riverside

About 35 km. South of Brandon, Highway #10 dips through the wide deep valley of the Souris River. This spot was the site of Sheppard's Ferry in pioneer times, and three successive bridges since then. The bridge in the photo is the second bridge, and served from 1929 until the 1960's. It is still intact and used for local traffic.

Liskum Campbell settled in the Riverside District in 1890. In the 1930's he built a store, gas pumps, and dance pavilion near the bridge on the north side of the river. It was known as Riverside Park. The adjacent ball diamond was home to the Riverside Canucks, who played there for over 40 years.

A park, commemorating Mr. Campbell, was established between the new and old bridges, and was recently been renovated after the flood of 2011.

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
